Presentation Title	Reducing Crime: How to Produce Real Results
Presentation Length	120-240 Minutes
Presentation Objective	To introduce police leaders to crime reduction through evidence-based policing and to provide evidence-based policing implementation strategies.
Presentation Description	The majority of law enforcement agencies across the country rely on the standard model of policing to reduce crime: random patrol, rapid response to calls for service, and prosecution of offenders in order to reduce crime. Nearly 50 years of research show that this model does not work. Significant research during the same time period has produced evidence to show what actually does work to reduce crime. This presentation will highlight some of the most important aspects of this research and show police leaders how to translate that research into practices that can produce real results in crime reduction, and well as how to institutionalize and sustain these practices.

Speaker's Biography	Tim Hegarty has been with the Riley County (KS) Police Department since 1995 and currently is a captain in command of his agency's Investigations Division. Previous commands include the Riley County Police Department' Patrol,

Administration, and Support Divisions. He has served as an adjunct instructor in the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, and Social Work at Kansas State University and as a subject matter expert and instructor for the Virginia Center for Policing Innovation in reducing homicide and violent crime through evidence-based policing. He is also a Level II Certified Instructor in Problem-Based Learning.

Hegarty led a hot spots policing research project that was recognized with the 2013 IACP/Sprint Bronze Award for Excellence in Policing Research, and he is a 2014 inductee of the Evidence-Based Policing Hall of Fame at George Mason University's Center for Evidence Based Crime Policy. He is also an Executive Fellow with the Police Foundation in Washington, DC. He has published works in the Police Chief magazine, Translational Criminology, the National Academy Associate magazine, and in the Journal of Intelligence and Analysis. Hegarty has been a speaker at conferences for the IACP, the Southern Police Institute, the Center for Evidence Based Crime Policy, and the Police Society for Problem Based Learning.
