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## Speaker's Biography

Louis is the founder and CEO of Q5, a private consulting firm specializing in communication between agencies and strategic partners. Chief Louis also act as the Senior Customer Advisor for Cellebrite, a global leader in forensic data management for law enforcement and currently a faculty member with FBI-LEEDA and has shown his expansive background of public service. Louis has spent 36+ years in leadership positions within the law enforcement/intelligence communities, and have served at both the federal, and local levels.

In July 2011, Mr. Quijas received a Presidential appointment to the Department of Homeland Security as Assistant Secretary for the Office for State and Local Law Enforcement. He served with honor and strong leadership in this position for 2 years.

In April of 2002, Louis was appointed by FBI Director Robert S. Mueller, III to the position of FBI Assistant Director, to oversee the efforts of the newly created Office of Law Enforcement Coordination. Prior to his appointment to the FBI, he was Chief of Police for the City of High Point, North Carolina. Louis accepted the position of Chief of Police upon his retirement from the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department after 25 years of service.

Having served over three decades in both local and federal law enforcement, Louis has a deep understanding of the intensifying challenges plaguing law enforcement agencies across the nation regarding secondary employment programs.
